## **Course Descriptions:**

#### **ADVANCED BAND**

**Duration:** Year (Offered Block 1) **UC/CSU Approved:** Yes (Area F – VPA)

NCAA Core Course: No Level: 9 - 12

**Prerequisite:** Approval of the instructor

**Description:** A Tri-School performance course offered for music students with some experience in ensemble playing and at least intermediate playing ability on one or more instruments. Members of the Advanced Band form the nucleus of the Symphonic Band and Pep Band. Students must provide their own instruments (some exceptions). Performances (including football and basketball games, concerts, etc.) are mandatory. This course meets during first period.

#### AP COMPUTER SCIENCE A

**Duration:** Year (Offered Block 2) **UC/CSU Approved:** Yes (Area C – Mathematics)

NCAA Core Course: No Level: 11, 12

Prerequisites: 1) A average in Algebra 2 or B average in Honors Algebra 2/Trig

2) Completion of the AP contract

**Description:** This course emphasizes object-oriented programming methodology with a concentration on problem-solving and algorithm development and is meant to be the equivalent of a first semester college-level course in Computer Science. It also includes an introduction to the study of data structures, design, documentation, and abstraction. This course is designed to prepare students for the Advanced Placement Examination administered by the College Board in May. Students are expected to take the Computer Science A Advanced Placement exam. Previous experience in computer programming is helpful. This course meets during second period.

### **ARCHITECTURAL DESIGN**

**Duration:** Year (Offered Block 1) **UC/CSU Approved:** Yes (Area F – VPA)

NCAA Core Course: No Level: 10 - 12

Prerequisite: None

**Description:** This full year course, open to sophomores through seniors, explores the principles of design and architecture. It provides a foundation for students who are interested in the fields of drafting, architecture, and engineering. Students are introduced to: architecture, the design process, architecture history, drawing and sketching, manual and CAD drafting. They learn techniques necessary to draw freehand and with instruments. The course includes a mixture of lectures, discussions, in-class assignments, presentations, drawings, research, and model

making. Students need to purchase initial drawing supplies at the bookstore (Approximate cost is \$70.00). Please note that students will also be required to purchase additional materials/supplies for their models throughout the year. This course meets during first period.

## **GERMAN 1-2**

**Duration:** Year (Offered Block 2) **UC/CSU Approved:** Yes (Area E – Language)

NCAA Core Course: Yes Level: 9 - 12

Prerequisite: None

**Description:** This is a first year course of German language and culture. In this course, the basic principles of listening, speaking, reading and writing are introduced to the students. Special Note: This course meets during second period.

#### **GERMAN 3-4**

**Duration:** Year (Offered Block 1) **UC/CSU Approved:** Yes (Area E - Language)

NCAA Core Course: Yes Level: 9-12

**Prerequisite:** C- average in German 2

**Description:** This is a second year course of German. A continuation of German 1-2, this course further develops the four major areas of language learning: reading, writing, listening and speaking. Cultural aspects of the German speaking world are also emphasized. This course meets during first period.

#### **GERMAN 5-6**

**Duration:** Year (Offered Block 3) **UC/CSU Approved:** Yes (Area E - Language)

NCAA Core Course: Yes Level: 9-12

**Prerequisite:** C average in German 3-4

**Description:** This is a third year course of German. Subject matter in this course is selected on a two-year basis so that students do not duplicate work completed the previous year. Grammar is reinforced as needed with special emphasis on the subjunctive. The four basic skills are stressed with emphasis on oral presentations, analysis and cultural studies such as music and art. This course meets during third period.

#### INTRO TO BUSINESS: ENTREPRENEURSHIP

**Duration:** Semester - fall (Offered Block 2)

**UC/CSU Approved:** Yes (Area G - Elective)

NCAA Core Course: No Level: 11, 12

Prerequisites: None

**Description:** This is a survey course designed to introduce students to the principles and functions of business from an entrepreneurial perspective. Business will be studies as part of the social, political, and economic environment. Students will look at real-world entrepreneurial topics influencing business today and interpret current business trends by studying relevant and interesting business content throughout the course. Themes of the course will include Business History, International Business, Ethics/Social Responsibility, Business Ownership/Organization leading into the Entrepreneurship area. Concepts of Business Law and Business communication will be present throughout the semester. May be taken in conjunction with Intro to Business: Marketing or as a standalone course. Note: This course meets during second period, fall semester.

INTRO TO BUSINESS: MARKETING

**Duration:** Semester - spring (Offered Block 2)

**UC/CSU Approved:** Yes (Area G - Elective)

NCAA Core Course: No Level: 11, 12 Prerequisites: None

**Description:** This is a survey course is designed to provide students with an introductory perspective into the management and marketing functions of operating a business. Business will be studies as part of the social, political, and economic environment. Students will look at real-world marketing and management topics influencing business today and interpret current business trends by studying relevant and interesting business content throughout the course. Themes of this course will include: Business Finance, Business Management/Leadership, Marketing, and E-Commerce/Business Technology. Concepts of Business Law and Business Communication will be present throughout the semester. May be taken in conjunction with Intro to Business: Entrepreneurship or as a standalone course. Note: This course meets during second period, spring semester.

#### JAZZ BAND

**Duration:** Year (Offered Block 0) **UC/CSU Approved:** Yes (Area F – VPA)

NCAA Core Course: No Level: 11. 12

Prerequisite: Approval of the instructor

**Description:** This course teaches visual recognition of modern and traditional jazz and rock melodies and rhythms, beginning to intermediate improvisation techniques and numerous performance practices that are peculiar to the medium. There is an opportunity for small and large group performance. Performances include festivals and concerts. All performances are mandatory. Students must take this course in addition to Advanced Band unless they play guitar, bass or piano. Note: This course meets Monday through Thursday during zero period.

**Duration:** Year (Offered Block 1) **UC/CSU Approved:** Yes (Area E – Language)

NCAA Core Course: Yes Level: 9 - 12

Prerequisite: None

**Description:** This is a first year course of Mandarin. Students will develop the basic skills in Mandarin Chinese, such as useful conversation for daily life. Students will also learn to read, write, speak and understand basic Mandarin Chinese characters and pinyin. Students will be exposed to a variety of Mandarin-speaking cultures in Mainland China, Taiwan, Singapore and more. Note: This course meets during first period.

#### **MANDARIN 3-4**

**Duration:** Year (Offered Block 2) **UC/CSU Approved:** Yes (Area E – Language)

NCAA Core Course: Yes Level: 9 - 12

Prerequisite: C- average in Mandarin 2

**Description:** This is a second year course of Mandarin. A continuation of Mandarin 1-2, this course maintains and develops oral competency, reading skills, writing skills and cultural awareness of the historical issues and influence of Mandarin-speaking cultures. Note: This course meets during second period.

#### **MANDARIN 5-6**

**Duration:** Year (Offered Block 3) **UC/CSU Approved:** Yes (Area E – Language)

NCAA Core Course: Yes Level: 9 - 12

Prerequisite: C average in Mandarin 4

**Description:** This is a third year course of Mandarin that builds on the material and skills developed in the first two years of Mandarin. The course reinforces previous material as well as continues to expand in the areas of grammar, vocabulary and conversation. Increased speaking of the target language with cultural accuracy is an important aspect of this course. This course meets during third period.

#### **MANDARIN 7-8**

**Duration:** Year (Offered Block 3) **UC/CSU Approved:** Yes (Area E – Language)

NCAA Core Course: Yes Level: 9 - 12

**Prerequisite:** B- average in Mandarin 5-6

**Description:** This is a fourth year course of Mandarin. Students will continue to develop the skills necessary to carry on extended conversations in Chinese, expressing their opinions on issues related to current events, Chinese society, politics, economics, education, and Chinese

culture. Students will be able to produce and present their own viewpoints of events by using the Chinese language in both spoken and written form. The class will be conducted entirely in Mandarin with an emphasis on active student participation in the target language. This course meets during third period.

## VIRTUAL ENTERPRISE

**Duration:** Year (Offered Block 1) **UC/CSU Approved:** Yes (Area G – Elective)

NCAA Core Course: No Level: 11, 12

Prerequisite: None

**Description:** In this course, students set up and run a simulated business to prepare them for real-world business environments. Students begin by developing the nature of their business, its product and services. They learn entrepreneurship skills and link to a global business network, where they can work with other businesses set up in similar programs at other schools as trade/business partners. They learn how to develop a management structure and engage in the daily operations of running a business, using current business software, communications and the Internet for business transactions. While involved in the simulated business environment, students focus on career preparation standards such as oral and written communication skills, employment literacy/professional growth, interpersonal skills, group dynamics, conflict resolution, personal skills and lifelong learning, and both creative and critical thinking, reasoning and problem-solving skills. Note: This course meets during first period.

## **Course Descriptions:**

## **ANATOMY & PHYSIOLOGY**

**Duration:** Year (Offered Block 0)

UC/CSU Approval: Yes Level: 11-12

**Prerequisite:** Recommendation of current science teacher.

**Description:** Anatomy and Physiology explores the structure and function of mammalian systems, with primary emphasis on human anatomy and physiology. Coursework involves lecture and laboratory dissection. The material covered includes an introduction to anatomical study, basic types of body tissues, and systems of the body. Each system will be studied in detail, the physiology portion primarily through lecture and the anatomy portion by lab investigations, including the dissection of a cat. Students will also have extensive use of microscopic study of cells and tissues. Students will learn the structures and function(s) of the integumentary, skeletal, muscular, digestive, circulo-respiratory, nervous, sensory, and endocrine systems. This course is a college-preparatory laboratory science course.

## **ANATOMY & PHYSIOLOGY HONORS**

**Duration:** Year (Offered Block 0)

**UC/CSU Approval:** Yes (weighted)

**Level:** 11-12

Prerequisite: Recommendation of current science teacher. Must have been in an Honors

Science class and performed at that level.

**Description:** This is a rigorous, college prep course which studies the activities that are characteristic of living matter within the human body. It is designed to give the student an overview of the structures and functions of the major systems of the human body. The course is intended for a student who is interested in pursuing a career in various medical fields and physical education. This course will provide exploratory experiences, laboratory and real-life applications in the better understanding of the human body. The topics to be covered will include basic anatomy and physiology; a review of basic chemistry; cells and tissue: skin and body membranes; the body systems and hierarchy: skeletal, muscular, nervous, senses, endocrine, cardiovascular, respiratory, digestive and metabolism as well as the urinary and lymphatic systems. The student shall be able to then analyze the body in terms of each body part separately and as part of the whole body. The intent of this course is to foster self-awareness of the functions of the human body, from the level of the cell through the level of the whole organism.

#### FORENSIC BIOLOGY

**Duration:** Year (Offered Block 1)

UC/CSU Approval: Yes Level: 10-12

**Prerequisite:** High school Biology course.

**Description:** Students will build on what they have learned in Biology by applying skills and concepts from biology, chemistry and physics to solve real-life problems within the realm of forensics. All lab activities will involve simulated evidence that will be age-appropriate. The textbook does not include graphic photos. For sophomores, this course will be a good introduction to basic concepts in chemistry and physics. Upper-division students will be able to apply what they have learned in Biology, Chemistry and Physics. This laboratory course will

teach students about the theory, concepts and applications of a full-service crime laboratory. It will include units in chemistry, physics, anthropology, biology, serology, photography, hair and fiber, fingerprinting, biotechnology, case studies and mock trial. Students will be instructed on how laboratory scientists analyze physical evidence, document evidence during laboratory analysis, and present results during testimony upon request of the attorney.

## NON DARKROOM PHOTOGRAPHY

**Duration:** Year (Offered Block 1)

Level: 9-12 Year 10 credits

UC/CSU Approval: Yes Prerequisite: None

**Description:** This is a beginning level, non-darkroom, art photography course intended to help students develop the ability to take, manipulate, print, alter, and blend their photography through their understanding of visual perception and personal experience. Using digital cameras and professional photo editing software, students learn the basic elements of art photography, develop observational skills and the ability to discuss and critique their experience. Through the year, students will study the world of art photography, its place in art history, and its importance in society. Students will complete written assignments as well as a portfolio of their work.

#### **AP PSYCHOLOGY**

**Duration:** Year (Offered Block 1)

UC/CSU Approval: Yes (weighted)

Level: 11-12 Year 10 credits

Prerequisite: B or better in most recent Social Science course (World History; Global Studies or U.S. History), or B- or better in most recent Honors or AP Social Science Course; no lower than B in most recent English and Science classes, or B- or better in most recent Honors or AP English and science classes; an analytical writing sample and recommendation of most recent Social Science teacher.

**Description:** AP Psychology is an elective course designed to introduce students to the study of human behavior and mental processes at a college level rigor and pace. Students are exposed to the history and subfields of psychology, the brain's structures and functions, altered states of consciousness, psychological testing, and psychological disorders. Students analyze the biopsychosocial approach to psychology in all human interactions and decisions. Emphasis will be placed on the ethics and statistical methods psychologists use in their science and practice as well as on famous psychological experiments that shaped the field of psychology. *This class involves an additional workload and extended content for the accelerated student.*

# **Course Descriptions:**

A PLACE AT THE TABLE: THE MINORITY EXPERIENCE IN AMERICA

**Duration**: Semester - fall (Offered Block 1)

UC/CSU Approval: UC/CSU Elective

**Level**: 11, 12

Prerequisite: None

Please note, this course is taught almost exclusively online.

During the semester there will be a few face-to-face meetings and several mandatory virtual class meetings.

**Description:** As the "great melting pot", America has always been a harbor for immigrants. Unfortunately they have not always been welcomed. This course will cover the major immigrant waves in our nation's history, emphasizing the different groups who comprised each wave and the reasons that brought them to America. In addition, we will look at the contributions that both groups and individuals have made to the American tapestry by studying famous (and some infamous) immigrants as well as analyzing the cultural contributions that are accepted as "American" today. The semester will culminate with a final project that will allow you to investigate your own family immigrant experience.

## DANCE V - IN-STEP PERFORMANCE COMPANY/PARTNERING TITLE

**Duration:** Year (Offered Blocks 1 & 2)

UC/CSU Approval: Yes Level: 9 - 12

**Prerequisite:** Membership and enrollment in the Dance V – In-Step Performance Company/Partnering Techniques class is by audition for NDHS students. Auditions are not required for Serra students. Auditions are held at the end of Spring semester every year. Students who make In-Step Performance Company and Partnering Techniques class are not required to audition again.

**Description**: This class combines body conditioning, stretching and strengthening, acrobatics, dance, and movement techniques for advanced performance. Serra students train with members of the NDHS Dance Company learning partnering stunts, lifting techniques, and movement styles (hip hop, acrobatic moves) appropriate to their level of ability and athleticism. Serra students will participate in the fall and spring dance showcases at NDHS. Serra students train during the Tri-School time slot and join NDHS students during a regular portion of their class time. NDHS Students who qualify for In-Step Performance Company and Partnering Techniques class, and have not completed PE 1, must complete such credit during the summer. No Exceptions: Please see your counselor. NDHS students who make the In-Step Performance Company are also eligible to enroll in Honors Dance without having to complete Beginning Dance A/B, Intermediate Dance A/B, and Advanced Dance.

## **Attire Requirements:**

NDHS students are required to provide their own dance footwear, undergarments, and

dancewear appropriate for advanced performance. Serra students are required to provide tennis shoes and clothing suitable for athletic movement and body conditioning.

#### ORCHESTRA

**Duration**: Year (Offered at Block 0)

UC/CSU Approval: Yes Level: 9 - 12

Prerequisites: Intermediate playing ability

**Description**: This Tri-School class is a performance-oriented course offered for students who play violin, viola, cello, bass or harp with at least an intermediate playing ability.
